Canadian Open Hickory Championship 2024















Once again a wonderful hickory golf week! It's hard to believe it's been 25 years! Wow, where has the time gone? And such memories - memories of road trips to the Rockies and Ron renting a bus for 40 - first stop, the liquor store in Olds! Canada/US Ryder cups with Max Hill and Johnny Bago dukeing it out to the last hole and Glen Jevnie driving the 9th green on Champions to two feet to win his match...the first years it seemed like John Wilson would be impossible to beat for the championship. Then the US exerted their influence with Modesto, California's Paul Biocini winning in 2003 (Paul just this year set a new Guiness world record for shooting his age - over 3500 times and counting!) and Nebraska's World Hickory Champion Randy Jensen winning in 2004. Beaumont Alberta's Ben Plaunt's juggernaut started in 2009 with 8 wins in the next 14 years. Through all this, one theme prevailed - the real winners weren't the ones with the lowest scores...the winners were the ones that had the most fun! And Ron and Edwin over time have been wonderful hosts and great examples of camarderie and sportsmanship.

First timers to this event quickly find that the Canadian Open Hickory Championship is much much more than just a competition....It's an event where you renew old acquaintances and make new friends ... and oh, yes, play a lot of golf!

And this year was no different with the exception that the numbers have grown. This year we had 105 different players during the 5 days (players from age 7 to 95) - 8 from the US, 8 from Ontario, 5 from Saskatchewan, 2 from BC, 1 from Mexico and 1 all the way from Japan! Of the 105, 91 teed it up for the Friday Championship. In spite of some rain during the Championship 27 holes, spirits weren't dampened and scores were good....well good for some!

Our thanks to Craig Spicer and his staff for the great conditions of the golf course. Maintaining the immaculate greens and fairways helps to make the Canadian Open Hickory Championship a special event. Thanks Craig! In addition, thanks go out to Brian and his staff for their help behind the scenes with the tee times, prizes and scramble details.

This year we had two pre-tournament road trips to local golf courses. Each year we choose two different courses on the Monday and Tuesday to get to know new players to the event and brush off some of the rust on the hickory skills.

Monday August 12 saw us at the Barrhead Golf Club, approximately 1 hour northwest of Edmonton. It is an 18-hole championship course designed by the renowned course architect Les Furber and has been included





in Golf Digest's "Best Places to Play" for the last three years and is remarked as a must stop for all Central Alberta golf enthusiasts.

Tuesday Aug 13 The pre-tournament road trip with another 48 golfers was to the Riverside Golf Course in the Edmonton river valley with great views of downtown Edmonton. Again wonderful weather and a nice hickory golf course greeted the golfers.

Wednesday Aug 14 featured the popular 4-person scramble this year with 92 players. This event really marks the beginning of the tournament because you get to play the tournament course, meet new players, pony up some cash and scrape any residual rust off your hickory game. Wednesday saw the team of Kerry Moore, Paul St. Laurent, Don Jackson and Carter Bond turning in a sparkling 14 under par 58 to take the first place prize. The top 6 teams were:

Friday Aug 16 Championship Friday dawned with overcast skies, little wind and a few wasps (those wearing kilts were in jeopardy - just ask Vaughn!). 91 players vied for the top spots in the 27 hole Canadian Open Championship with triple shotguns on the Champions, Old Hickory and Traditions 9s. After the morning Champions shotgun, the Legends hosted a pizza lunch in the Clubhouse and followed with group photos on the putting green.



After 27 holes, the Open Division was won by newcomer Sean Utley withe a score of 114 on the 3 nines. Along with the trophy goes the Canadian Open Hickory Championship flag from the last hole. Second place went to Ben Plaunt at 117.

The highly competitive Senior Division was taken by John Wilson of the Wetaskiwin golf club with a 27 hole score of 114. Interestingly, John Wilson won the inaugural Canadian Hickory Open in 2000 and now adds his name 25 years later to the Senior winner list! Well done John! Second place was Chris Ream at 116.





Following the final round, Ron and Edwin hosted a BBQ and awards ceremony in the clubhouse. It was a gathering of the hickory players coupled with the annual Legends Honoree ceremony. Each year the Legends honors an Alberta resident that has made significant contributions to golf in Alberta. This years honoree was Kevin Hogan.

Kevin has been the Head Professional at

Edmonton's Victoria Golf Course since 1994. Victoria GC is Canada's oldest municipal golf course and one the busiest municipal golf courses in the world. An avid golfer, when asked what was the most number of holes he played in one day...342 to raise money for the Canadian Cancer Society. Kevin always tells people that he has



the best office in town! Kevin well deserves his place among the Legends honorees.

So, a great way to finish off a wonderful week! With the 25th Annual event a fond memory, we now turn our attention to the upcoming 26th Canadian Open Hickory championship August 11-15, 2025. Players from this years edition are excited to return and already those that missed out are looking at their calendars too. 

Hardest 9 holes - Old Hickory followed by Traditions and then Champions.


Hardest hole of all 27 - #9 Traditions Easiest hole of all 27 - #3 Champions
